LexFarm offers *year-round* Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) programs

that bring local organic food to you. CSA shares are typically purchased in the winter, with weekly pick-ups of sustainably-grown produce during the harvest season.

We plant, grow, and harvest vegetables, fruits,

herbs and flowers to provide fresh, certified-organic produce to our community.

Subsidized Summer Vegetable shares are available for SNAP recipients.

And, we partner with local farms to supplement what we

grow. This allows us to offer fruit, mushrooms, eggs and additional varieties of vegetables.

LexFarm is located at 52 Lowell Street in Lexington.


